Math

Ms. Wawner continued our study of symmetry. This week, we created large symmetric pictures with geometric tiles. We also learned about the symmetry of snowflakes and created our own winter wonderland picture. Next week, Ms. Wawner's class will be working on graphing. Next week, Ms. Shank's class will continue with graphing and will be assessing students' knowledge and counting of teen numbers.

Language Arts/Reading/Writing

Ms. Wawner's class started the week talking about the superheroes we know and love like Spiderman and Batman and certain traits they possess. We listened to the story "Superheroes are Everywhere" by Kamala Harris and talked about real-life superheroes and role models in our lives. This led to learning about two heroes and role models-Jesus and Martin Luther King Jr. We celebrated MLK day on Thursday by learning about how he stood up for what's right and tried to spread peace. Our class spent time reviewing and being assessed on the 13 letters and their sounds we have learned thus far. We will focus on the letter R when we return from break and learn a new set of sight words. Ms. Shank's class also worked on the letter R. Next week we will be working on the letter U. Our sight word for next week is "is". We are reading a lot of nonfiction books about animals that hibernate, migrate, and next week we will be reading a book on arctic hares and polar bears to fit with our study of animal adaptations. We will also begin our formal handwriting lessons.

<u>Religion</u>

Ms. Wawner's class read stories about Jesus and talked about how he is kind, helpful, faithful, and brave. We determined he is a role model in the way he spreads peace and love. We focused on how he taught us to love our enemies and came up with scenarios of how we could do that, even when it's hard. Ms. Shank's class will begin a study of Moses.

Science/Social Studies

Ms. Wawner's class wrapped up our study of states of matter by focusing on water in its three states. We learned how we can melt ice by applying heat or other substances. We did an experiment to see what melts ice the fastest-sand, baking soda, or salt. Students loved working with their tablemates to try to melt an ice cube before others in the class using different materials and strategies. Ms. Shank's class learned about animals that migrate. We learned about the monarch butterfly and its great migration. We also found out that they not only migrate but hibernate as well. Next week we will focus on animal adaptations by reading about the polar bear and the arctic hare. We will do an experiment to let the students see how the adaptation of blubber protects the polar bear from the cold. We will also begin a unit on matter.
