6th: This week the 6th graders finished their unit on the Post-Civil War Era. Next week they will begin exploring the Gilded Age.

7th: This week the 7th graders began learning about the 1950s. Next they will continue this unit with a discussion of the early Cold War.

8th: This week the 8th graders wrote an essay about the Mongol Empire and began their unit on the Tang Dynasty of China. Next week they will learn about Feudal Japan and then take their unit test on Friday.

Math 6 (Garland): This past week, we tested out on our Proportional Relationships unit. This coming week, we will start a new unit, entitled, "Expressions and Properties", which really starts laying the foundation of Pre-Algebraic skills. We will revisit the skill of GEMDAS

(order of operations) as we start to substitute values for variables and evaluate expressions.

Pre-Algebra (Garland): At the end of last week, we assessed our Angle solving skills. This coming week, we will get into solving triangles, with a focus on Right Triangles and the Pythagorean Theorem. Students will be reminded that when they solve square roots in Algebra, we focus on two possible solutions, however in contrast, when we work in Geometry, we focus only on the positive solution.(distance is always a positive value). Emphasis will be placed on drawing diagrams/labeling them correctly from word problems to help set up equations to solve.

Geometry (Garland): This past week, we investigated midsegments of trapezoids. Next week we will practice this skill, which finalizes our unit on Quadrilaterals. We will take a Socrative Quiz and SOL Practice on Quadrilaterals on January 31st and February 2nd. I plan on testing on February 3rd.

Math 7 (Reid): This past week we took our test on Number Sense and started doing some algebraic work by creating our Operations Word List and using it to translate words into algebraic expressions. If you want a good giggle (and see learning in action), ask your child to give you a dramatic reading off of their homework We have had so much fun this week and learned a lot! Next week, we will continue to work with expressions by evaluating them and starting to simplify them.

Algebra (Reid): This past week we have worked more with finding equations of lines (both parallel and perpendicular). Next week, we will finish equations of lines with line of best fit and use it to make predictions. I will also introduce their Mountain Range Project which will blend math and art : We will test on Equations of Lines on Thursday, February 9th.

7th Language Arts (Lowdon): The next IRA is due Feb. 14. Students are to read the remainder of Chapter 1 (*Red Pony*) for Monday. If they are confused, they may listen to it. We will begin Wordly Wise lesson 5 on Monday. There are grammar slides on coordinating conjunctions in Google classroom. We will practice identifying and diagramming these next week. The date for the quiz will be announced.

8th Language Arts (Lowdon): The next IRA is due Feb. 14. On Monday we will finish watching the movie version of a play by Thornton Wilder, *Our Town*. There is a Wordly Wise test on lesson 4 on block day. I will be conferencing with each student on his/her writing, now that the rough drafts of the fictional adaptations of *Lord of the Flies* have been completed.

6th (DeVane): This week we focused on the story of Moses. They also took their quiz on Chapter A (The Patriarchs). Next week, we will finish talking about Moses and take a quiz. We will also have a Catholic Bee as part of Catholic Schools Week and start talking about Joshua.

7th (Fallica): We had a great week reading and discussing our chapter on the structure of the Catholic Church. We focused on Matthew 28: 16-20 and the Great Commission. The Great Commission is when Jesus told his Apostles they must go out and teach others; make them disciples and baptize them. We will have a Chapter 23 quiz on Monday. Additionally, we will be reading The Winged Watchman by Hilda van Stockum over the next several weeks. This beautiful novel is about a Catholic family and their faith in God during the German occupation of Holland.

8th (Bryan): To prepare for their Church project, students continue to study architectural styles and are beginning to sketch their designs. We will be studying Christian Morality and Social Justice for the next few weeks, beginning with a closer look at what Jesus teaches in the Beatitudes. We learned about C.S. Lewis and began to learn the vocabulary for *The Screwtape Letters*, which we will be reading in class. Feel free to purchase the book for your student if they'd like a copy. In class, we'll be using the digital/audio version from Learning Ally.

Charlottesville Catholic School Science Fair is around the corner and will be an open-house event. All are welcome. Bring your students from 4:30-6:00 pm on Thursday, February 2. Middle school students will have their projects on display throughout the school and will describe their research to you and the judges. We are offering a study hall for students that need to stay until the event starts. Please plan to pick up your student at 6pm. Recommended dress is professional attire. Students may stay in uniforms but are welcome to change.

6th: This week we continued to explore plants. We dissected flowers and seeds and observed pollen with the microscopes. Next week we will start exploring the animal kingdom following the science fair.

7th: This week we started physics and explored motion. We tested and experimented with our running skills and compared our speed with Usain Bolt's World Record time. We also look at speed as slope on a distance vs time graph. Next week after the science fair we will continue with motion and experiment with acceleration.

8th: This week we started geologic time. We discussed superposition and the difference between eons and epochs. Next week after the science fair we will start to research periods in time and the fossil record.

7th and 8th: Last week we worked on clothing and Friday we did relay races! The students

were told an article of clothing in Spanish and had to go find it before racing back and tagging the next teammate. We had a lot of fun practicing clothes and making some crazy outfits!

This week students kept practicing clothing and worked on noun adjective agreement. For example: "Pantalones rojos" are red pants. Rojo is the color red, but we have to make it plural so it agrees with pantalones since pants is a plural word.

This week students had a quiz on clothing and turned in their paper doll project. We then started on rooms of the house and objects of the house!

Next week students will learn how to describe the location of an item and will practice describing different rooms. This will work on rooms of the house, objects, location, and noun and adjective agreement!

The students are learning a lot and doing a great job talking about a variety of topics. I encourage you to ask your student what they have been up to in Spanish and have them speak a bit for you! It is truly amazing what they all have accomplished so far this year!
