- Martha's Market is not just a marketplace; it is a community-driven initiative dedicated to supporting women's health and the fight against breast cancer. Last year, thanks to the tireless efforts of our volunteers and the generous support of our community, the Women's Committee raised nearly \$185,000. These funds were instrumental in providing 200 free breast health exams to women who are underinsured or uninsured in our community. We also continued contributing to Marianne's Room assisting more than 1,000 women with wigs, scarves, lotions, shampoos, advice and more during their cancer journey as well as funding the spring Fly Fling trip as part of the healing journey. To make this year's event even more successful, we need volunteers to assist with various tasks, including:
 - **-Set- Up:** Carrying boxes, unloading cars, and potentially directing traffic as vendors set up their booths. We have 45 incredible vendors who will be setting up between 6 and 9am. (Early, I know!)
 - -Break- Down: Assisting vendors with packing up, ensuring the venue is clean and organized after the event, and potentially directing traffic. Breakdown will take from 4 to 5:30pm.

-Balloon Delivery: At 10:00 we need a few volunteers to pick up pre-ordered balloon bouquets from The Party Starts Here in Barracks Road and deliver them to about a dozen participating businesses at or close to the downtown mall.

6th Grade US History: This week the 6th graders learned about the Reconstruction Era of American History. Next week they will discuss Westward Expansion and the Oregon Trail.

7th Grade US History: This week the 7th graders learned about the New Deal and the First 100 days of FDR's presidency. Next week they will learn about the rise of dictators in Europe.

8th Grade World History: This week the 8th graders learned about Greek history and the competition between Athens and Sparta. Next week they will analyze the life of Alexander the Great and decide if he really was that great.

Math 6 (Garland): This past week, we had a test on integer operations. This coming week, we will start a new unit, focusing on fractions and decimals. This week's focus will be on writing, reducing, and comparing fractions, working with equivalent fractions, and finally diving into fraction addition/subtraction..

Pre-Algebra (Garland): This past week, we revisited scientific notation through the lens of exponents. This coming week, we will put the finishing touches on our 2nd unit (Algebraic Expressions) by exploring addition and subtraction of Polynomials. Students will get a take home assessment on October 23rd (which should be submitted by Sunday evening, October 27th) on Algebraic Expressions.

Geometry (Garland): This past week, we worked on the Parallel Town project, which involves creating a town based on pre-set parameters of angles associated with parallel lines. This is due to be handed in on Monday (October 21st). This coming week, we will review skill work on Angles of Transversals. Students will test these skills on Thursday, October 24th.

Math 7 (Reid): This past week the kids had their 1st Quarter Binder check on Tuesday. We also have been working on evaluating expressions. On our block day, the kids started to create our Operations Word List which is a compilation of words/phrases that could indicate addition/subtraction/multiplication/division. I hope they will keep this document for the next couple of years Next week, we will finish our work with expressions by translating words to algebraic symbols. The kids next test (1st test of the 2nd Quarter) will be on Algebraic Expressions on their block day of Wednesday (10.30) or Thursday (10.31). It will include simplifying using order of operations, using the distributive property and combining like terms, evaluating expressions and translating from words to algebraic symbols.

Algebra (Reid): This past week the kids had their 1st Quarter Binder check on Tuesday. This past week we also finished up our unit on Solving & Graphing Inequalities and Word Problems. The kids next test (1st test of the 2nd Quarter) will be on Algebraic Expressions on their block day of Wednesday (10.23) or Thursday (10.24). It will include solving & graphing inequalities, compound inequalities, absolute value inequalities and word problems. Our next unit will be on slope and starting to graph lines. Please check in with your child to make sure that they have ¼" graph paper as we will be starting to use that more and more in our next unit.

Composition, Literature, and Language Arts -

6th Grade English Composition (Kerrigan): This week, we practiced compound sentences, with two independent clauses. Next week, we are working on compound predicates and compound subjects.

6th Grade Literature Vocabulary (Kerrigan): This week, we wrapped up our novel study on *A Long Way from Chicago*. Next week, we will be starting our unit on *Hatchet*. A descriptive writing project will accompany this novel study during Q2.

7th Literature/Vocab (Hernandez): This week, students worked on and submitted their second IRA of the quarter. We also continued our analysis of *Dandelion Wine*. We finish reading the novel for Monday and test on it during our block days next week. A study guide will be posted to Google Classroom and we will spend time outlining essays in preparation for the test. It would be helpful for students to locate their copy of *The Giver* by Lois Lowry so that they can bring it to class after next week.

8th Literature/Vocab (Hernandez): This week, students worked on and submitted their second IRA of the quarter. We also finished the analysis quiz on "Wartime Sunday" and "Silent Season of a Hero" and started our second narrative writing assignment (due at the end of next week). Students began analyzing the symbols in Eiseley's narrative essay, "The Brown Wasps," which we will continue next week as we get ready to finish up our narrative nonfiction unit.

6th(Mehl): This week the students studied and completed assignments on the Angelus prayer, St. Teresa of Avila, and the upcoming Sunday Mass readings. Students also turned in their service logs. During our chapel time, we did an exercise of Lectio Divina, the goal of which was both to learn the process and to experience it first hand. It turned out to be a meaningful way for us to bring the first quarter focus on prayer to a close.

6th Grade Life Science: This week we discussed genetics and covered the difference between environmental factors and genes. We start to learn about Mendel and his work with pea plants. Next week we will look at how punnett squares work.

7th Grade Physical Science: This week we started to discuss oxidation numbers and how to make molecules and compounds. We also experimented with slime. Next week we will continue to investigate chemical reactions.

8th Grade Earth Science: This week we started our Mission to Mars project and started building our rockets from scratch. Next we will continue to discuss factors to consider for space travel.

Spanish 1 [Part 1–7th grade] (DeMaio): This week, seventh graders continued doing activities related to what they like to do and reviewing and using new vocabulary. They learned how to conjugate the verb "gustar=to like" and the function of indirect object pronouns (me, te, le, nos, os, les). They also reviewed the conjugation of the verb estar in order to use prepositions in Spanish. In the long class block they presented their projects related to a Hispanic country. Next week: more vocabulary in use, grammar: infinitives, negatives, expressing agreement and disagreement.







Spanish 1 [Part 2–8th grade](DeMaio): The eighth grade students took their last test of this quarter regarding the verb "ir=to go" and they also learned about prepositions and how to conjugate the verb to play=jugar. They also review the function of indirect object pronouns (me, te, le, nos, os, les) They did both written and conversation activities.

During the long block class and in collaboration with Mrs. Devlin, the students had the opportunity to decorate the sugar skulls which will be used to display on the altar that we are going to make to celebrate "dia de los muertos=the day of the dead" in the first week of November. A huge thank you to Monica Jordan Nora's mom who made the sugar skulls and the icing, the students had a lot of fun decorating and learning about this beautiful Mexican tradition. Next week, the beginning of the topic "Una fiesta de cumpleaños=A birthday party" vocabulary about this topic, grammar: verb "tener=to have" and possessive adjectives.
