Even though the weather is turning colder, we will continue to get the students outside for recess as often as possible. Please make sure your child has the outerwear needed so that they can participate in recess. Below are the guidelines we follow:

- $\circ~$ Students should stay inside if the wind-chill factor is below 25°F.
- If the wind-chill is in the 30s, students should have a coat (not a sweatshirt) and it should be encouraged that their heads are covered (hat or cinched coat/sweatshirt hood).
- If the wind-chill is in the 40s, students should at least have a sweatshirt on.
- Students who do not have the proper outerwear will sit in the front office for recess.

6th: This week the 6th graders learned about political cartoons and their impact on Boss Tweed. Next week they will take their Gilded Age Test.

7th: This week the 7th graders finished their 1950s. Next week they will move onto the 60s and Beatlemania!

8th: This week the 8th graders learned about the Mongols and Genghis Khan. Next week they will learn about Feudal Japan.

Math 6 (Garland): This past week, we continued to focus on simplifying expressions through the use of color coding. We will continue that skill this week and combine it with Distribution, a property we have talked about before in an earlier unit. Towards week's end, we will look at the Distribution property in reverse, and refer to it as Factoring out a Greatest Common Factor (GCF)

Pre-Algebra (Garland): We took a dive into Geometric Transformations on the Coordinate Plane. This coming week, we will finish up this mini-unit of Geometry by looking at Rotations and Translations. During on block class, we will review all of these skills and will test on Friday, March 1st.

Geometry (Garland): This past Friday, we investigated similarity ratios that exist between perimeter and area of similar figures. This coming Monday, we will do an investigation on the Geometric Mean of a triangle. We will quiz on our Similarity Unit this coming Thursday and do a Unit Test Review on Friday. (I plan on testing on March 5th)

Math 7 (Reid): This past week we continued our work of solving 1 step equations. We finished the week solving equations using multiplication and division by revisiting our work with fractions. Some of the kids are having an easier time of letting all of that soak in, while some are struggling. That is completely normal as we are dealing with an abstract concept

of solving for an unknown. If your child continues to struggle with solving 1 step equations, please encourage your child to contact me and figure out a time we can work on this skill together. Next week starting on our block day, we will start to solve 2 step equations which will involve using both addition or subtraction **and** multiplication or division to solve the equation.

Algebra (Reid): This past week we continued our work with systems of linear equations and inequalities. As we are studying systems, I am also trying to teach the kids how to use the Desmos online graphing calculator. On Friday, the kids got an assignment made up completely of word problems. After the system is set up, Desmos makes it very easy to solve. We are using the previous skills of translating word problems as well as assigning variables in word problems. We are pushing towards our next test on systems of equations & inequalities on the kid's block day either March 6th or 7th.

Composition, Literature, and Language Arts -

6th Grade Composition (Kerrigan): Students took an open-notes quiz on the first four lessons of verbs on Friday, which included verb forms, irregular participles, and troublesome verbs, like *lie* vs. *lay.* Next week, we will jump back into *Vocabulary Power Plus* with Lesson 13. We will also continue our verb unit with linking verbs and simple verb tenses (present, past, future).

6th Grade Literature (Hernandez): This week, we continued with *A Long Walk to Water*. We practiced making inferences from the text and then put that knowledge to use in our analysis quiz for chapters 1-3. We will continue with chapters 4-6 next week. Looking ahead, our next IRA is due Tuesday, March 19th.

7th Language Arts (Hernandez): This week, the 7th grade took a test on the Poe texts that we have studied so far. We also started looking at Poe's most famous poem, "The Raven." Next week, we will continue with "The Raven" and "The Bells" and start a writing project for our Poe unit. Looking ahead, our next IRA is due Tuesday, March 19th.

8th Language Arts (Hernandez): This week, we continued reading and analyzing *Unbroken*. We also did a bit more grammar revision. 8th grade interviewed people as part of a narrative writing project for *Unbroken*. The rough draft for that project is due March 1st. Looking ahead, our next IRA is due Tuesday, March 19th.

6th(Mehl): This week we did Stations of the Cross in the Chapel, and we also started to work on memorizing them. The students did the Sunday readings on their own, answering questions that I had prepared for them. They were prompted to see how the word "Son" was prominent in all the readings, including the Psalm. We studied Chapter 11 of Catholic Connections, which focuses on Jesus Christ as True God and True Man. The students currently have study sets to memorize the Memorare prayer, the Old Testament Books of Wisdom and the Prophets, and the Stations of the Cross. On Tuesday, we will have a test on the Memorare prayer.

7th(Mehl): This week we did Stations of the Cross in the Chapel, and we also started to work on memorizing them. The students did the Sunday readings on their own, answering questions that I had prepared for them. They were prompted to see how the word "Son" was prominent in all the readings, including the Psalm. We studied Chapter 27 of Catholic Connections, which is an introduction to the Liturgy. The students currently have study sets to memorize the Anima Christi prayer, the Books of the New Testament, and the Stations of the Cross. This week students are handing in their projects on ancient Jewish feasts. On Tuesday, we will have a test on the Anima Christi prayer.

8th (Fallica and Bryan): This week students dissected *The Nicene Creed* to better understand the 3 parts of the Trinity: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. They finished *Do Hard Things* and began our new unit in church history, reforming and rebuilding the Church. Finally, our Catholic Relief Services (CRS) Rice Bowl charity emphasized the life and dignity of the

human person and our commitment to living this social responsibility.

6th: This week students started to work on their invertebrate projects. They invested over 3 hours investigating invertebrates. This weekend they will put their finishing touches on their projects and bring them in on Monday. Next week we will start to research vertebrates and ecology.

7th: This week students built and shared their energy transfer machines intended to apply toothpaste to a toothbrush. This engineering fear was challenging but they persevered. Next week we will assess motion and move into energy.

8th: This week we started to investigate the atmosphere and specifically discussed terms used to measure and describe weather. We also researched and debated cloud seeding. Next week we continue weather.

6th(DeMaio): The sixth grade students learned about the verb "estar"= to be. One or the most common verb in Spanish, and how to conjugate it according to the rules. Next week they will

continue learning more about the verb "estar" and then "ser" They can access the information and topics learned during the electives class in the Google Classroom.

7th(DeMaio): The students continue learning about topic Y tú, ¿cómo eres? (What are you like?). Upon completion of this chapter, they will be able to: talk about personality traits , ask and tell what people are like, use adjectives to describe people. They also have done quite a few activities with their Aunténtico practice books to improve reading, writing, hearing and speaking skills. This Friday they worked on writing an email in Spanish which they had to introduce themselves and describe their personality and what they like or don't like to do. Remember that they can all access the information and topics learned in class in the Google Classroom.

Next week: To be verb=estar/ser

8th(Mehl): This week we did workbook and SpanishDictionary exercises on the direct object pronouns. We started studying our new vocabulary list on Spanish body parts. We also did listening exercises. Next week we will complete direct object pronouns and start looking at irregular forms of the preterite tense.
