6th: This week the 6th graders learned about the Gilded Age and the ways. Be sure to ask them about Upton Sinclair's "The Jungle." Next week they will explore famous workers rights movements of the era.

7th: This week the 6th graders learned about 1950s American culture and the partitioning of East and West Germany. Next week they will learn about the Korean War and McCarthyism.



8th: This week the 8th graders learned about Feudal Japan. Next week they will take their unit test on the Middle Ages, Mongols, China (pt 2), and Feudal Japan.

Math 6 (Garland): This past week, we explored evaluating expressions, with heavy emphasis on substituting negative numbers for variables. Next week, we will translate written expressions and evaluate them. I plan on quizzing on this skill, Friday, February 10th.

Pre-Algebra (Garland): This past week, we ended by starting to familiarize ourselves with the Pythagorean Theorem. Next week, we will get into word problems, where students will have to produce a right triangle diagram before solving. An in class project will be assigned and diagrammed on the students' block day, in which they will create their own Pythagorean Word Problem. This will be due on Monday, February 13th. I also plan on assessing the students' triangle skills on that same day.

Geometry (Garland): This past Friday, we finished up our unit on Quadrilaterals. This week, we will take an SOL Practice on Quadrilaterals and test on our unit this coming Thursday. On Friday, we will get into a new unit, entitled, "Similarity". I plan on using a personal hobby of mine, Shark Teeth collecting, to "reel" students into this unit.

Math 7 (Reid): This past week we evaluated expressions and showed a lot of growth from 1st semester using Order of Operations and being able to show our work. It has been such a BEAUTIFUL thing to see! Evaluating expressions allows us to wrap back around and use our skills with signed numbers and order of operations. I have tried to point out to the kids many times the progress they have made and how proud I am of them and all of their hard work! We also started to simplify expressions by combining like terms. Next week we will continue to combine like terms including the distributive property and also learn about various other mathematical properties. Parents, if you wouldn't mind and have the ability to help I would really appreciate it. Algebra (Reid): This week we learned about how to find the line of best fit through our Hula Hoop Lab. We needed to get real life data to use to find a trend line, so why not use a hula hoop?!? We then used this skill to make predictions about other situations if that trend line continued. Next week, we will be talking more in depth about our Mountain Project and heading towards a test on Writing the Equations of Lines. 6th Grade Composition (Kerrigan): This past week, we completed Lesson 11 in *Vocabulary Power Plus* (VPP). Each week, VPP homework is due on Thursday and we have a quiz on Friday. In our grammar studies, we have a quiz on verbs this upcoming Wednesday, Feb. 8.

6th Grade Literature (Kerrigan): The students are enjoying our latest novel, *Maniac Magee*, and our small-group discussions connecting situations in our book to lessons from the Bible. Students also recently wrote poetry on the meaning of home, and they will be researching Black poets and choosing poems to recite as part of our public speaking curriculum.

7th Language Arts (Lowdon): The first IRA for 3rd quarter is due on Feb. 14. There will be a Wordly Wise test, lesson 5, next week. We will continue to review conjunctions and their proper use in sentences next week. Our plan for literature is to continue reading *The Red Pony* and have fabulous discussions about the deeper meaning of the text.

8th Language Arts (Lowdon): The first IRA for 3rd quarter is due on Feb. 14. There will be a Wordly Wise test, lesson 5, next week. Students will have an open-note quiz on *Our Town* next week on block day. We will begin our next novel, *Where the Red Fern Grows*, next week.

7th and 8th: This week we have been learning about the house! We have worked on the parts of the house (door, window, roof, ect) and the rooms of the house (bathroom, bedroom, living room, ect). Students also learned the different items of the house (bed, microwave, sink, rug, ect). Next week we will learn location and practice describing where things are located.

Coming up students will have a speaking quiz on the house. For the quiz students will preview pictures of different rooms of the house. On the day of the quiz students will speak one on one with me. I will pull one of the photos at random and the student will be expected to describe the room, the objects of the room and the location of them. This will be spontaneous speaking although we have done similar activities in class. I recommend students continue to practice at home so they feel comfortable and ready the day of the quiz.

I will post the date of the quiz soon on Google classroom, but I want to make sure we have enough time to practice location beforehand.
