### Science

Hands-on happiness! The Hawks visited the STEM Lab on Wednesday to experiment with how canyons are formed. Using cornmeal and "rainmakers," these excellent experimenters observed first-hand how erosion impacts landforms. Seeing the negative repercussions of erosion, these excellent engineers were challenged to use cotton balls, toothpicks, and aluminum foil to prevent erosion on "cornmeal mountains." Teamwork and discovery learning build deep understanding and generate palpable excitement!

Marvelous meteorologists! As part of the weather/earth changes unit, these future forecasters enjoyed a special visit with AJ Willy of CBS19 News. The Hawks kept AJ on his toes with tons of thoughtful questions. Check out some of the brilliant wonderings our curious questioners posed:

- Why does Waynesboro get more snow than Charlottesville?
- Why do clouds turn gray before it rains?
- What is the worst weather you have ever reported?
- Can there be tornadoes in the winter?
- Can animals be harmed in extreme weather?
- How common are fire tornadoes?
- Have you ever made a mistake on air?

- What kinds of extreme weather (other than snow) are possible in Antarctica?
- When you were little, did you want to grow up to be a meteorologist?
- How do the flowers and blooming trees all know to come out at the same time?
- Will we get a snow day this school year?
- What is the fastest recorded wind speed?
- Can you get a tornado in the desert?
- What is the hardest part about being a meteorologist?

## Math

Rulers up! The Hawks used both nonstandard (books, shoes, paperclips, thumbs, etc.) and standard (rulers and yardsticks) tools to measure supplies/furniture in our classrooms, as well as distances on the playground and blacktop. These measurement mavens are becoming proficient with inches, feet, and yards!
